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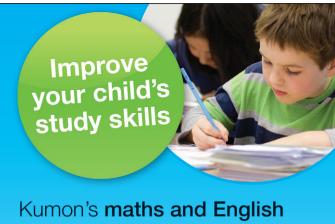

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Putting the wheels in motion

Local schools and a cycling group joined us to launch the District's first 'Local Cycling and Walking Infrastructure Plan'.

Leader of the Council. Cllr Peter Fleming, unveiled the plan on 30 January with pupils from Riverhead Infants' School, the Weald of Kent annex and cyclists in Otford.

The plan was produced with help from Sustrans, a United Kingdombased walking, wheeling and cycling charity, and the custodian of the National Cycle Network. It sets out eight potential routes in detail, how

they should be prioritised and how they could be delivered.

The proposals include widening existing footpaths, the creation of new links between existing footpaths and upgrading road crossings to make the environment more cycling and walking friendly.

The routes rank as a top priority as they will link Riverhead and Amherst

> schools in the west of the town with Trinity, Weald of Kent and Tunbridge Wells Grammar School for Boys annexes in the east.

There will also be routes to Knole Academy and Sevenoaks Railway Station, picking up Sevenoaks Primary, Walthamstow Hall Junior School and Russell House, all on Bradbourne Park Road.

Cllr Peter Fleming says: "We are excited to be moving forward with a plan for new cycling and walking routes, which allows us to apply for funding to make these a reality.

"By improving these connections, we are hoping the routes will be popular with children, commuters and the wider community. Encouraging and making it easier and safer for residents to use sustainable forms of travel is a top priority and forms part of our Net Zero ambitions for the District.

"We also have funding in place for the next plan in Swanley and to explore how an Otford to Sevenoaks route could be delivered."

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Have your say on 4 May

On Thursday 4 May 2023, you can have your say about how local services are run

when local council elections take place.

Which elections are taking place?

Sevenoaks District Council

Elections are held every four years. You will live in one of 26 'wards' and, depending on the population of the ward, you can vote for between one and three Councillors.

Town and parish councils

These elections are also held every four years.

The number of seats on each council varies according to the population they serve. In some parishes, no elections will take place as there may only be enough candidates to fill the available seats.

Standing in the elections

If you're aged 18 or over, you can stand in the local elections, even if you are not connected with a political party. Visit our website for details. The deadline to put in your nomination is 4pm on Tuesday 4 April 2023.

Voting at the elections

Registering to vote

You can only vote if you are on the electoral register.

You can register at www.gov.uk/register-to-vote or by calling us on **01732 227000** before the deadline of Monday 17 April 2023.

Voting on election day

Before the elections, you'll receive an official poll card which will be in an envelope with details of your polling station. Polling stations are open from 7am to 10pm on Thursday 4 May.

The Government has changed the rules around elections and from now on, you will need to bring valid photo ID to the polling station - full details can be viewed on the opposite page.

Postal voting

Contact us to request a postal vote application form or download one from our website www.sevenoaks.gov. uk/voting. To vote by post on 4 May apply by 5pm on Tuesday 18 April 2023.

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Proxy voting

A proxy vote allows you to appoint someone to vote on your behalf. Apply by 5pm on Tuesday 25 April 2023.

VOTE

The person voting for you will need to bring their own photo ID to the polling station unless they have requested a postal vote - full details can be seen on the page opposite.

Election results

Votes will be counted on Friday 5 May.

District results will be posted on www.sevenoaks.gov.uk/ elections and on Twitter @sdc_newsdesk as they come in.

Town and parish results will be posted on Twitter @ sdc_newsdesk.

Results will also be made available at our offices and at your local town or parish council and may be reported in your local newspaper.

Sevenoaks Town Neighbourhood Plan referendum

If you live in Sevenoaks town, you'll also have an opportunity to have your say on the Sevenoaks Town Neighbourhood Plan on 4 May.

The Plan has been produced by Sevenoaks Town Council following consultation with local people. If the plan has public support at the referendum on 4 May, it would be used to guide future development and growth in Sevenoaks town for the next 15 years.

On 4 May, residents who live in the Sevenoaks Town Council area will receive a referendum ballot paper asking if the Sevenoaks Town Neighbourhood Plan should be used to help determine local planning applications.

Voter ID at elections

The Government has introduced new requirements for voters to show photo ID when voting at a polling station.

This new requirement will apply for the first time at polls taking place on Thursday 4 May 2023.

The new rules will affect anyone who votes in person as well as proxy voters – this means the person who you have trusted to vote on your behalf will have to take their own identification to the polling station.

Postal voters will not be affected by the new rules.

Accepted forms of voter ID

The chances are you may already have a form of photo ID that is acceptable. Only original documents can be accepted at the polling station - scanned images or copies cannot be accepted.

Even if your photo ID has expired, it will be accepted so long as the photograph is still a good likeness to you.

Accepted forms of photo ID include:

- Passport
- Driving licence (including a provisional license)
- Blue Badge
- Certain concessionary travel cards
- Identity card with PASS mark (Proof of Age Standards Scheme)
- Biometric Immigration document
- Defence identity card
- Certain national identity cards

If you don't have an accepted form of photo ID

If you don't already have an accepted form of photo ID, or you're not confident your photo ID still looks like you, you can apply for a free voter ID document, known as a 'Voter Authority Certificate'.

You can apply for a Voter Authority Cerficate online at www.gov.uk/apply-for-photo-id-voter-authority-certificate.

Alternatively, we can send you a paper application form.

The deadline to apply for a Voter Authority Certificate for polls on 4 May is 5pm on Tuesday 25 April 2023.

Tree planted in memory of the Queen

An alder that formed part of a stunning tree sculpture outside of Buckingham Palace during the Queen's Platinum Jubilee celebrations has been planted in the grounds of Bradbourne Lakes.

The alder was planted in February by our Chairman, Cllr Avril Hunter, and The Lady Colgrain, the Lord-Lieutenant of Kent.

The tree originally formed part of the 'Tree of Trees', a stunning 21-metre sculpture featuring 350 native trees. It stood outside Buckingham Palace as part of The Queen's Platinum Jubilee weekend celebrations back in June.

The 'Tree of Trees' were gifted to selected community groups. Lady Colgrain nominated us to receive one of the 350 prized trees.



Council Chairman, Cllr Avril Hunter, says: "We are so pleased this special tree was gifted to the residents of the District thanks to the work of Lady Colgrain. It will be a reminder for generations to come of the respect and affection held by so many for our former sovereign, Queen Elizabeth II."

A blooming wonderful District!

Just like the hibernating bumblebee emerging from hidden nests around the garden, we all look forward to beautiful spring flowers. Luckily we aren't quite so dependent on nectar and pollen, but we do enjoy darting about from one spectacular wildflower area to another.

Sevenoaks District certainly has a fabulous array on offer, with our bluebell woodlands among the best in the country.

Emmetts Garden and Chartwell

Some of the most beautiful areas to explore include the woodland and estates around Emmetts Garden and Chartwell. While access to both might be best through the National Trust properties, the perfumed bluebell woods can also be accessed from nearby car parks at Toys Hill and Ide Hill. Take in the views at Mariners Hill - before the trees come into leaf - with a glorious outlook across the Weald. Chartwell has extensive orchards and the apple blossom is stunning if you time it right. Wildflower meadows created nearby add to the beauty and the ecosystem.

Hever Castle

The grounds of Hever Castle (close to Hever rail station) are rightly famous for the springtime display, with over 70,000 daffodils opening their bright yellow flowers during March. Partnered with the Marie Curie charity, these plants symbolise new beginnings. But don't forget that crocuses, hyacinths, wallflowers, pansies and tulips can all be enjoyed at different times throughout the spring.

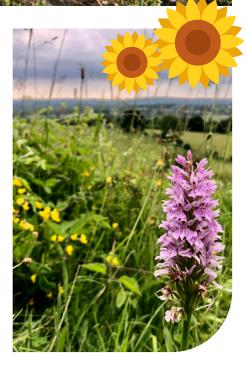


Opening their gates on 15 March, Riverhill Himalayan Gardens also knows how to put on a spring display, with cheerful daffodils, a colourful primrose meadow, and a bluebell trail through the chestnut woods from April. Linked to a Bluebell Festival, there's plenty to explore and enjoy, including crafts and other activities in the Garden Room. Check their website for exact dates.

Penshurst Place

Boasting another woodland trail with plenty of bluebells, and a refurbished café, Penshurst Place was also the lucky recipient of 29 cherry trees, a gift from the Emperor of Japan to celebrate Anglo-Japanese relations. The 100m long peony border comes into bloom in May, with an impressive display of huge flowers in all hues of pink to red. Penshurst Place is now open at weekends then daily from 1 April.





Other favourite spots for wildflowers and bluebells

Shoreham Woods has several woodland areas which boast spectacular bluebell displays (accessible by train from Shoreham station), while One Tree Hill near Godden Green and Bore Place near Penshurst also have beautiful woodland flowers and plenty of well-marked trails to explore. Don't forget, the early wildflower displays – so vital for bees and butterflies emerging from hibernation – can be enjoyed at our District's many nature reserves run by Kent Wildlife Trust. Check its website www.kentwildlifetrust.org.uk for guided walks.

Our very own

Ray of light!

Over the last 33 years,
Countryside Ranger, Ray Froud,
has dedicated much of his working
life to the careful management of over
250 hectares of precious woodland
owned by us and maintained for the
benefit of locals and nature.

The areas of land under Ray's care were once ancient woodland. As far back as 1951, the site at Farningham was designated a Special Site of Scientific Interest. But nonetheless, they became commercial enterprises. Shoreham Woods was bought by the Forestry Commission in the 1950s and planted with

Norway Spruce, Norway Maple, European Larch and Beech, while Farningham Wood was commercially coppiced. However, with the downturn of the domestic timber market in the 1960s, coppicing ceased and the woodland suffered.

In 1974, we purchased Farningham Wood and reinstated coppicing to benefit the ecosystem. Once designated 'declining', Farningham

Wood Nature Reserve now boasts the highest classification available from Natural England, with rare insects, plants and wildlife returning in great numbers. Some trees in Shoreham Woods have been thinned to allow more light in, and the paths widened for habitat diversity, with great results. And who do we have to thank? None other than our resident ranger, Ray.

Ray spoke with In Shape about his time at the Council.

"I was brought in from my previous career as an engineer to help with storm damage after the devastation of the hurricane in 1987," says Ray.

"Although I worked initially in Farningham Wood, I moved over to Shoreham Woods in the early 90s. There we created new paths and wide grassy cut-throughs ('rides'). I then created 45 degree scalloped edges, curving in and out of available light. Ground nesting birds like to hide deeper in the brambles, while other wildlife chooses

the shallow edges. So maybe try and keep your dog out of those areas! The Royal Forestry Society were really impressed and said they had 'never seen anything like this before' resulting in major awards in the late 1990s.

"We've also made a big impact on improving the habitats as well as opening up new paths for the public, and Oxenhill Shaw has been totally transformed, from farm fields to young woodland and meadows. In Shoreham Woods, areas around the edges now have amazing wildlife – frogs, toads, snakes, slow worms, badgers, butterflies and all kinds of new plants appearing. Cornmint turned up one year, it's always evolving."

"When we open up new areas to the light, different areas respond – we had hundreds of foxgloves one year near the car park. At Farningham Wood and Oxenhill Shaw all kinds of new species keep appearing, both real havens for birds. And even dormice! I'm really proud of the work we've achieved. If you put your heart and soul into something, you will always get something out!"

Value added swimming

Sencio Community Leisure has changed the way it charges for swimming lessons to help with the cost and to make adjustments for cancelled sessions. In addition, it has introduced benefits for those signed-up to the new scheme.

"By switching everyone to direct debit, it has enabled us to improve what we offer. Not only does this help spread the cost, but it does away with the need for re-enrolment and - importantly - payments will be automatically adjusted if a child is unwell or unable to attend a lesson and it has to be cancelled, doing away



with the need to wait for a credit note", says Jane Parish, Sencio's Chief Executive.

Sencio is also adding a membership for swimming lesson participants that incorporates unlimited swimming seven-days a week (including during school holidays), as well as discounts

on other activities such as inflatable sessions, sport and courses.

Do I really need a fitness gadget?

Heart rate monitors, calorie-tracking apps and step counters have become de-rigueur for many gym enthusiasts, but do we really need them?

"Wearable technology really does have its uses, especially if you're training for a specific event or goal, or are working with a fitness or medical professional on a health and wellbeing objective," says James Arnold, Wellness Manager at Sencio Community Leisure.

"Technogym - the equipment we use - can track your fitness progress via a digital platform. You can also connect third party apps such as Garmin,

Strava and Fitbit to your My Wellness account for an overview of all your activities both in the gym and across daily life. Many people find this a valuable and motivational tool."

And what about calorie counting apps such as My Fitness Pal?

"I would caution against an excessive fixation with tracking everything you eat. Calorie counting apps can be useful as they help us understand what we eat and also educate us about which foods have the most nutritional or calorific value. Sometimes what we think is healthy is often not because of things such as 'hidden' sugars, so look at calorie tracking and portion measurement as a short-term tool to help you become better informed."



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Prepare for tee-off

With the longer days, comes the chance to get back outdoors and return to a favourite sport. For, golfers though, there are a few things to consider.

Set goals

"If you always do what you always did, you will always get what you always got", so said Albert Einstein. And it applies, of course, to golf, so goal setting is not only useful it can make your game much more enjoyable. And be realistic, one or two that you tackle across the season will help you mentally.

Body fit

It's one thing to hone that swing, but you should also be preparing your body for 18-rounds. It can be long walks, a yoga class or a simple bit of regular stretching at home.

Tool kit

There are two issues here. First off, get the clubs out of storage and dust them off. Retired pro and Sky Sports pundit Nick Dougherty says: "If you find that your clubs aren't that forgiving maybe that is when to look for new gear. With drivers it is tricky, but I talk about forgiveness because you've got to start by putting the ball in play and not missing the target by too much".

Putting perfection

Few golfers are happy with their putting and the reason, of course, is obvious – the result is directly responsible for what goes on that scorecard, so paying close attention to this important skill is in your best interest. The problem with putting is that something which, on the surface, doesn't look especially difficult is actually much more challenging than it first appears. It's therefore important to package your putting armoury into one cohesive skills set, and that includes your ability to read the greens, an accurate stroke, speed control, and a steady performance under pressure.



Inspiration

Speaking of a mental attitude, any sport or pastime is enhanced by inspiration so pick-up that golf memoir or read that blog. Mindset is key.

Exercise referral scheme launches at White Oak Leisure Centre

The first GP exercise referral programme in the District, launched at White Oak Leisure Centre in January, is creating opportunities for people with, or at risk of, medical conditions to become more active in a supportive and welcoming environment.

White Oak Leisure Centre now enables local GPs and other health professionals to refer patients for a 12 week programme to help them live a healthier, happier life.

The scheme, which is available to all Sevenoaks District residents. will benefit those with long-term health conditions, including asthma, arthritis, high blood pressure,

diabetes and obesity, as well as depression, anxiety, osteoporosis and other conditions, including rehabilitation from COVID-19.

Robert Hutton, Sport Development Manager at White Oak Leisure Centre, shares more about the new scheme.

"The scheme gives residents the opportunity to combat different

> illnesses and conditions through exercise. Once referred, participants will have an initial consultation and we'll put together a programme just for them. Two more consultations will follow to ensure everything is going well.

"One of the factors when people are referred can be

mental health and gaining social interaction. What can help is meeting new people at the centre.

"There are no barriers, so participants have access to everything at the facility. We have the Feel Good suite which offers lower intensity exercise options for reduced mobility and hands on help from colleagues experienced in guiding people with additional requirements.

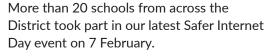
