Gates of the Former White Oak Hospital Non-Designated Heritage Assets Proposed by the Swanley Neighbourhood Plan October 2023

Hospitals form a notable part of Swanley's history. Once the railway had been established it led to Swanley becoming a horticultural centre and it was also seen as being the ideal place to send sick Londoners. Swanley's soil and climate were recognised as a healing environment that was easily accessible from London by train. (see Swanley Profile in the Swanley Neighbourhood Plan Evidence base)

Three hospitals were established in Swanley: the Kettlewell (or Alexandra) Hospital in 1885, Parkwood Hospital in 1893 and White Oak Hospital in 1897.

The Kettlewell stood on the site of the Asda car park and was for poor patients from London who needed to recuperate after major surgery, and so rested in Swanley.

The Parkwood hospital was similarly used, and White Oak was originally for children with eye diseases.

During both world wars Kettlewell & Parkwood were used as military hospitals, Parkwood became part of the Sidcup Hospital for facial injuries.

The setting up of the National Health Service in 1948 meant these old London Hospitals became redundant – Kettlewell and White Oak closed in 1959 and Parkwood ceased being a hospital in the early 1960's.

Some of the Hospitals were re-purposed - Parkwood still exists in its entirety in Beechenlea Lane – now Parkwood Hall School.

Kettlewells Chapel was replaced by the Roman Catholic church (Church of the Twelve Apostles) on Bartholomew Way/Sycamore Drive.

Only the gates of the White Oak Hospital remain but are an important reminder of this particular feature of Swanley's history and one of the older building features in this part of Swanley.
