Putting the wheels in motion

Construction has begun on the Sevenoaks 'East to West' walking and cycling route to link seven schools with local facilities.

The two-mile route is being delivered by us and Kent County Council. The scheme was drawn up with help from transport experts Sustrans with local people commenting on the proposals leading to changes and improvements.

Once open, walkers, wheelers (people on scooters, parents with prams and wheelchair users) and cyclists will be provided with safe opportunities to exercise, benefitting their health, while improving air quality and helping to cut the District's carbon footprint.

It is hoped that the route will take some cars off the roads, especially at busy school times, helping to improving journeys for car drivers while making the streets safer.

The route links Trinity School, The Weald of Kent and Tunbridge Wells Grammar School for Boys in the east with Sevenoaks Primary School and Walthamstow Junior School and Amherst and Riverhead Schools in the west. It also provides easy access to Sevenoaks Rail station, Sevenoaks Hospital and Knole Academy.



Work is expected to be finished during spring 2025 and includes widening and creating new links between footpaths and upgrading some road crossings.

The route is being delivered with a £1.2 million grant secured from the Government.

Cllr Irene Roy, our Cabinet Member for Cleaner and Greener, says: "This project has been a long term ambition of both Sevenoaks District Council and Kent County Council, and I am delighted to see it progress into fruition.

"Encouraging our residents to use safe, sustainable travel is a top priority and forms part of our ambitions to tackle climate change. This travel route should be popular with children, commuters and the wider community.

"We want to thank the hundreds of local people who took part in our consultations about the proposals. Thanks to their comments, we have made a number of adjustments and improvements along the route.

"We are really excited work has started and we cannot wait for the Sevenoaks 'East to West' walking and cycling route to open next year."


Kent County Council's Cabinet Member for Highways and Transport, Neil Baker, adds: "We continue to work with local communities to make sure they are getting what they need from the spaces around them.

"We want people to be able to move around and make local journeys in the most convenient way for them, and sometimes that means not using a car.

"Making sure pedestrians and cyclists have safe and accessible routes will ensure we encourage people to choose active travel more often."

A new vision for our waste service

We've agreed an ambitious plan to increase the range of materials we collect for recycling, helping the environment, starting with new glass and food waste collections in 2026.

Our new 'Waste & Recycling Strategy', agreed in November, sets out a roadmap to reduce the carbon footprint of our collection services while improving efficiency.

We're committed to tackling climate change and we've promised to reduce general waste and increase recycling. This is because recycling helps to prevent climate change by saving energy and helping to transform items that have been used into something new.

But recycling rates in the Sevenoaks District are low, around 38%. The Government has set a new national recycling target of 65% by 2035. Unless we change our current arrangements, we are unlikely to meet this target.

Since the pandemic, the amount of waste we collect has increased by about a third as more people work and shop from home. This has led to more packaging and waste.

We've made a start by introducing reusable recycling bags to most households, cutting down on single use plastics.

To help us decide on the best options for our waste collection service and improve recycling rates, we are starting work with...

- A District-wide survey to help us understand residents' views and preferences for waste collections
- A thorough review of our waste services by spring 2025 taking account of residents' feedback. This review will consider the collection containers we provide to residents and the possible introduction of wheelie bins for general waste. It will also include a timetable for introducing any changes
- New weekly food waste collections and glass collections every other week by April 2026
- Over time, we will look to collect new items for recycling, such as small household electrical goods and textiles. We also want to introduce further initiatives to cut carbon emissions from our collection services.

Cllr Irene Roy, our Cabinet Member for Cleaner and Greener, says:

"Our commitment to tackle climate change means we need to change and improve our waste collection services. We want to give our communities more options to recycle, helping to reduce their general waste to an absolute minimum.

"We intend to bring in glass and food waste collections in the near future plus other improvements in later years. But before we introduce any changes, we want to hear the views of our residents."

Thriving over the festive period

In Shape spoke with our Health Team about their top tips for a healthy Christmas.

Yulia, Health Team Leader, says: "It's possible to enjoy the festivities without compromising too much. Firstly, be realistic. We're all likely to drink and eat more than usual and exercise and move less. So don't be too hard on yourself. One or two celebration meals are unlikely to make a big difference to your health."

Maria, One You advisor, adds: "Aim to incorporate some alcohol-free days during the holidays. If you want to manage your drinking, avoid stocking up on alcohol. If



you're attending an event where there could be lots of drink, take your own soft or low alcohol alternatives."

Jennie said: "Over Christmas, we may have more free time, so you could do some light exercise, for example a walk or even a jog. Again, be realistic about how much you want to do. Aim for about half an hour a day."

Natalie adds "Many of us will eat more over the festive period, but there's a few things we can do to maintain our health. A good helping of vegetables with a meal will add vitamins and minerals, and drinking plenty of water can reduce your appetite."

New Waste Transfer Station for Sevenoaks

Kent County Council (KCC) has opened a new Sevenoaks Waste Transfer Station with the capacity to handle more recycling.

KCC is required to dispose of household waste collected by us. Once collected at the kerbside, it is taken to a Waste Transfer Station where it is deposited, bulked and then taken to be processed or disposed of. These facilities are not open to the public to dispose of their household waste, however, the site does allow for the disposal of trade waste by prior arrangement.

The new Sevenoaks transfer station includes the infrastructure to allow waste to be disposed of sustainably well into the future. It will enable more materials to be recycled,

helping us to meet the Government's future recycling targets.

It can handle up to 75,000 tonnes of waste a year, twice the capacity of the previous facility.

The previous transfer station, built in 1990, was no longer fit for purpose, struggling to manage the increase in waste and the requirement to collect and segregate a much wider range of materials. Realising the demand, KCC secured a 30-year leasing arrangement with Darenth River Ballast Company for the new site.

Construction started in July 2023 with the site opening in September 2024.

Our Cabinet Member for Cleaner and Greener, Cllr Irene Roy, says: "The new KCC run site provides more facilities and opportunities to recycle a much wider range of materials. Crucially, this ties in with our plans to transform our collection services, giving residents greater opportunities to recycle much more of their waste."

Rob Thomas, KCC's Cabinet Member for the Environment, adds: "The facility is an impressive structure, allowing far more waste to be sustainably disposed of and ensuring nothing is wasted."

FREE green, retrofit training

We're offering free training for businesses and individuals in green construction skills to improve the energy efficiency of new and existing buildings.

Making homes and business property more energy efficient is key to reducing the District's carbon footprint, helping us to tackle climate change. But, there is currently not enough people with the skills and knowledge to meet the needs of the booming sustainable building and energy sector.

So we're working with MidKent College to provide free training. Places are limited.

All courses provide recognised qualifications. These can cover anything from basic installation skills, through to supporting you to become a trusted advisor or project manager.

The green way to warm your home

With a large number of homeowners already living in heat pump ready homes, there is huge potential to support more people in making greener energy choices and to move to this incredible technology within the next few months."

We have taken another step to reduce the impact of our services by recycling our used PPE.

Every year, our waste collectors, street cleaners and fly-tip removal teams use up to 2,000 pairs of safety gloves.

Until last year, the gloves were put in with the rubbish. But thanks to a new partnership with SMI, they are now recycled.

The gloves are shredded and reused to make a whole host of new items, including dog beds, mats and jackets. Anything that cannot be reused is ground into pellets and used for energy. Absolutely nothing goes to waste!

Buzz around the bus stop!


During August, we installed our first Living Roof bus shelter in Edenbridge High Street.

Living Roofs or 'Bee Bus Stops' support native wildlife by providing green havens for bees and are built using 100% recycled or upcycled materials.

The roof, which was created by Clear Channel UK, includes a mix of native wildflowers and other flowering plants to bolster the number of bees and other pollinators. The roof will burst into life in the spring.

Our Cabinet Member for Cleaner and Greener, Cllr Irene Roy, says: "We're delighted to have our first ecofriendly bus shelter in the District.

"Not only will it look great when the weather warms up, it will help attract pollinating insects, supporting biodiversity and our climate change ambitions."



Real Christmas tree collections

There are lots of options to recycle your real Christmas tree for FREE after this year's festivities have ended.

Option 1 - Use our Garden Waste collection service (for permit holders only)
If you hold a Garden Waste collection permit, simply place your unwanted tree in your garden waste bin and we'll pick it up on your usual collection day from 13 January 2025. Your Garden Waste bin lid must be closed before collection so you may need to cut up your tree. We can take trees with a trunk of up to 90mm (3.5") in diameter.

Option 2 – Take your tree to a Household Waste Recycling Site
Take your tree to one of Kent County Council's Household Waste
Recycling Sites (informally known as the tip or the dump). They
will take larger trees that are too big for us to collect. Visit

Option 3 - Hospice in the Weald collections

Concerns raised about new Government housing targets

We recently wrote to the Government with our concerns about the revised National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF) with new housing targets.

Over the summer, the new Government asked for views on its updated NPPF. It includes a revised housing target for the Sevenoaks District that jumped from 704 to 1,113 new homes to be built every year, a 58% increase on the current target.

In response, we said we welcomed efforts to boost local housing supply to meet residents' needs, including more affordable housing in new developments. However, we raised a number of concerns.

We argued the method for calculating the new housing target is flawed. The calculation is based on the affordability of homes and average local incomes. But it did not consider that many residents work in London where wages are higher. The target did not take account of future trends either.





While supporting the use of 'Grey Belt' sites (poor quality and already developed Green Belt land), we said these sites should only be developed in locations near transport and local facilities. We also stressed councils should decide which sites are in the Grey Belt and not developers.

We also raised concerns that there are no proposals to make developers build the homes that have been granted planning permission.

Crucially, we reiterated our long-standing stance that the Green Belt is incredibly valued, and should only be built on in very limited circumstances.

Cllr Julia Thornton, our Cabinet Member for Planning and Conservation, says: "While we remain committed to protecting the overwhelming majority of our Green Belt, we will have a duty to do everything possible to meet the Government's new housing targets.

"We have highlighted what we believe to be serious issues with the Government's revised NPPF.

"The method of calculating the number of new homes does not take account of local need. Building 1,113 new homes every year until 2040 will be especially challenging given our District is 93% Green Belt, the second highest in the country, and 60% National Landscape (AONB).

"We have been urging Government for some time to give us the tools to encourage developers to build homes on sites with planning permission. These tools could include charging Council Tax or Business Rates after a period of time. Building out these already granted schemes would make a big difference to the supply of new houses, both in our District and nationwide.

Local Plan update

Once the government publishes the final version of the National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF) by the end of the year, we can publish our revised Local Plan timetable.

The Local Plan will be updated to reflect the final changes to the NPPF. This may involve considering additional sites for housing and targeted consultations with landowners and affected communities.

White Oak Leisure Centre unveils £200k upgrade after membership surge

Since its grand opening just two and a half years ago, Swanley's White Oak Leisure Centre has welcomed thousands of residents through its door - with numbers continuing to grow following a recent surge in fitness memberships.

The growth of gym-goers

In just over two years, White Oak Leisure Centre has experienced a 58 per cent increase in fitness memberships.


The Centre's inclusive feel and wide array of activities on offer for locals of all ages and abilities means White Oak is a haven for accessible sporting activity - leading to more local fitness enthusiasts using the gym than ever before.

Hot on the heels of this recent growth, Everyone Active, which manages the facility in partnership with us, recently funded a £200k gym upgrade project, helping to support both new and existing customers in their sporting journeys.

A new age for fitness equipment

The upgraded gym boasts twice as many Olympic squat racks, alongside new equipment such as a plate-loaded glute drive, standing calf raise, bicep curl, and triceps extension machines, expanding its strength training offering to meet the growing demand.

Members can now also enjoy an enhanced functional area featuring a Life Fitness rig with two half racks, wall ball targets and a battle rope. A Ski Erg, a piece of workout equipment that works the arms, legs and core, has also been installed for a full-body workout experience never seen before at the Swanley Centre.



And, with the upgrade featuring a new look and feel, the new gym space will ensure members are kept motivated through the winter months and the January fitness surge.

Beyond the gym

To cater for its growing membership base, White Oak Leisure Centre has also significantly expanded its group exercise offerings, increasing from 45 classes per week to an impressive 75 classes.

The expanded timetable now includes Pilates, METCON, additional classes for older adults and instructor-led core classes, as well as an increase in popular classes ranging from a high-energy HIIT workout, to rejuvenating yoga classes.

Full steam ahead for rail partnership

As 2025 approaches, and the nation celebrates the 200th anniversary of the railway, In Shape looks at the Darent Valley Line and how communities are coming together to support the route.

The railway age began with the opening of the Stockton & Darlington Railway in 1825. Over the next 50 or so years, some 18,000 miles of track were laid and thousands of stations were built.

One of these lines was the Swanley to Sevenoaks railway opening in the 1860s. Going through some of our most stunning countryside, the line transformed access to and from London and the coast. It also left its mark with striking structures, including the nine arched viaduct in Eynsford.

Today, it is known as the Darent Valley Line. For the past four years, the Darent Valley Community Rail Partnership, consisting of dedicated volunteers, local councils and rail operating companies, has been working to promote and improve the six stations along the line. You can find out more about this Partnership at www. darentvalleycrp.org and by downloading the new Rail Trails app.





Shoreham is one of three rural stations on the line that has benefitted from new directional signage. New planters, filled with plants grown by local villagers, benefit the bees who live in the station chimney! Shoreham Village School recently worked with artist Ola Intu to produce a mural for the station.





Sevenoaks Station has benefitted from pollinator-friendly planters and the 'Bugingham Palace' bug hotel. Maintained by volunteers, these improvements are brightening up the area while supporting wildlife. A new mural was recently painted at the station.


Bat & Ball Station

was beautifully restored in 2019 with Heritage Lottery funding. A stunning mural was recently painted on the road bridge by artist Ola Intu depicting the past and present of the line. You can also buy posters representing the beautiful areas within reach of the stations by artist Kit Boyd and enjoy delicious food and drink at the station café.









Award winning Eynsford in Bloom look after the grounds around **Eynsford Station**. The Partnership recently renovated the waiting room. As part of the 200th anniversary of the railway, there are plans for a permanent exhibit within the Porter's Lodge, including old uniforms, baggage, a trolley and information about the history of the railway. New planters are cared for by Wendy Wright who works at the station.





Otford Station hosts a Darent Valley landscape photography exhibition by Sevenoaks Camera Club and local residents. A new wildlife-friendly garden opened to the side of the station, maintained by volunteers. And if you're waiting for a train, take a moment to view the display about the Station's railway history.





Swanley Station has benefitted from a co-funded £5 million rebuild with secure cycle parking and a cycle ramp. The partnership has added lots of new planters lovingly looked after by local residents and Broomhill Bank School students. The station is hosting two displays: local photographs by Sevenoaks Camera Club and posters by Swanley History Society. Students from nearby music college SupaJam are working on a sound art project at Swanley and other stations along the Line.

Residents have their say on Sevenoaks Business Park

During the autumn, we asked for views on our proposals for a new business park on Otford Road, Sevenoaks.

The site is currently used for storage and previously was a Kent County Council household waste recycling centre. The land is well developed with buildings and tarmacked ground. But, in recent years, the site has been under utilised so we want to put it into better use to support our local economy.

We are proposing four, small industrial units with a drive through. These would provide much needed business space and new jobs, benefitting local people.

Around 50 people attended our drop in event in September and nearly 100 people completed our survey.



Lots of local businesses and their staff are taking advantage of our free SEEDL online learning courses.

Described as the 'Netflix of live learning' and the 'Peloton for the brain', SEEDL offers an entire education library. More than 200 courses are available covering a wide range of topics to help employees develop new skills and employers to improve their performance.

Each course lasts an hour and is delivered in real time giving participants the chance to get involved and ask questions. Recordings of each course are available after.

There's no limit on the number of courses a business or employee can take.

The headlines from the survey were:

- 58% believed the Business Park would support the local economy, 20% were not sure
- 56% supported building the business park on already developed land, 38% were not sure
- 79% said it should include energy saving features (solar panels, low carbon heating, electric vehicle charging points and a cycle shelter), 10% were not sure
- 90% said the site should include planting to support biodiversity, 4% were not sure
- 56% supported the choice of materials for the building exterior, 35% were not sure

The proposal is now being refined following the consultation. We intend to submit a planning application in the New Year.

Help reducing your energy bills

Schemes are available to help residents, usually on low incomes, to reduce their energy bills by better insulating their home or installing efficient heating.

Home Upgrade Grants

Grants are available for residents with a household income of £36,000 or below who do not use gas to heat their home. The home must also have an Energy Performance Certificate (EPC) of D to G. If you do not have an EPC, one will be completed on application.

Once you apply, we will arrange for an initial assessment of your home. Energy saving measures will then be recommended. These might include air source heat pumps, solar energy systems, loft or cavity wall insulation.

Views sought on Council ward boundaries

The Local Government Boundary Commission for England has launched a consultation to review the way wards are made up across the Sevenoaks District.

The Commission has not undertaken a review of the Sevenoaks District Council wards since 2003. Since that time, house building and population change has caused some imbalance in the number of electors each Councillor represents.

As part of the review, the Commission has decided there should be 48 Sevenoaks District Councillors from the next District Council elections in May 2027. Currently the Council has 54 Councillors.

The Commission is now considering how the existing District ward boundaries need to change so that each ward has roughly the same number of electors per Councillor and reflects the current communities.

The Commission is keen to hear from local residents and others about how best to draw up these new ward boundaries. You can have your say by 20 January 2025 at www.commission.org.uk/all-reviews/sevenoaks or by emailing reviews@lgbce.org.uk.

Alternatively, you can write to: Review Officer (Sevenoaks), The Local Boundary Commission for England, 7th Floor 3, Bunhill Row, London EC1Y 8YZ.

Once this consultation closes, the Commission will publish its proposals for the new District Council ward boundaries on 15 April 2025 and there will be an opportunity to have a final say from 13 May to 21 July 2025.

Any proposed changes to the District Ward boundaries would not affect the existing boundaries for Kent County Council, MP constituencies, or the external boundaries of Sevenoaks District.

Professor Colin Mellors, Chair of the Local Government Boundary Commission for England, says: "We are looking for your views, as local people, on how you think wards in the Sevenoaks District should be drawn up so they reflect local communities and identities.

"By telling us about where you live and where you access local services, it will help us to create appropriate and meaningful boundaries.

"It might be something as straightforward as where you go for shops, schools or a sporting venue, whether you see a road, park or river as a dividing feature or the heart of a community, or which areas have joint projects."

How to report used nitrous oxide cans

Nitrous oxide, also called 'laughing gas', damages the health of users. The canisters also pose a danger to our staff.

Nitrous oxide has health impacts for users. It can lead to mental health problems, a weakened immune system and damage to the lungs and brain.

It's also a Class C drug. Possession or sale for recreational purposes is a criminal offence. Anyone caught with nitrous oxide could face a caution, community service, a fine or up to two years in prison.

The cans, and other gas canisters, also pose a serious danger to our waste collectors and street cleaners who pick them up. They can explode in the back of collection vehicles, injuring staff.

Because of the risks, we make special collections for discarded nitrous oxide and other gas canisters.
